Research Questions

- Data
 - **What data sets** are the cities seeking to **understand the activity** of STR platforms?
 - **What data sets** are the cities seeking to **enforce regulations** for STR platforms?
 - **How** are they collecting it?
- Negotiations
 - What are the **objectives and success of negotiation** between Cities and Short-Term Rental Platforms?
- Collaboration
 - **How are cities collaborating** with other cities?
 - If not, **are they interested** in this type of collaboration?

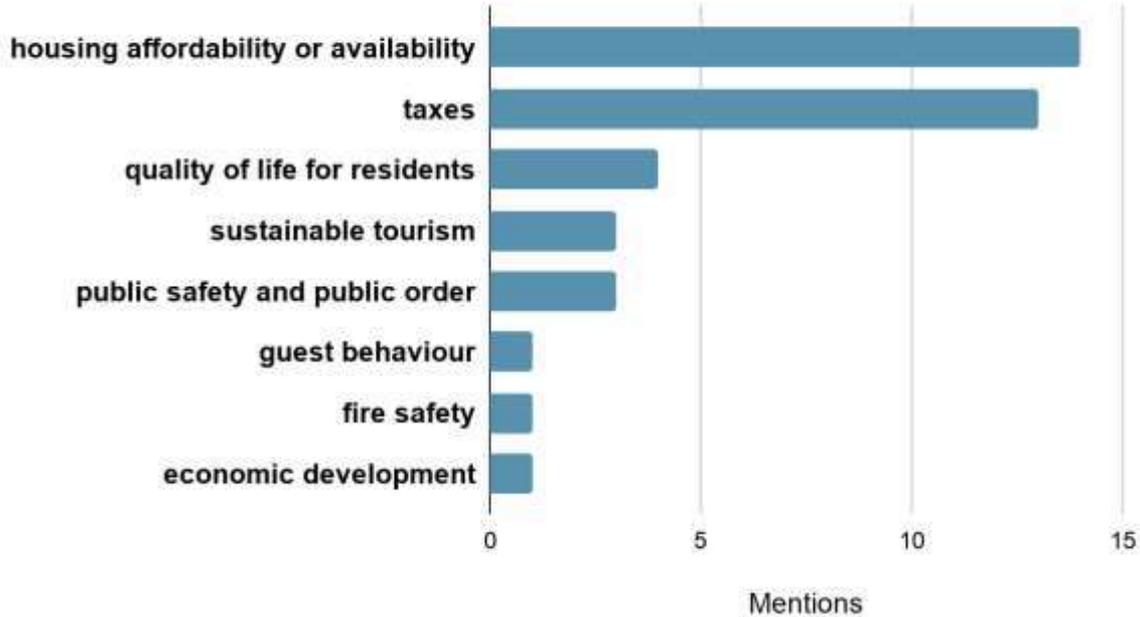
Survey and Interview Participants

Amsterdam; Athens; **Barcelona**; Berlin; Bologna; **Bordeaux**; **Grenoble**; Krakow; Montreal; Munich; Neapoli; Paris; Porto; Rotterdam; **San Francisco**; Tallinn; Thessaloniki; Umea; Valencia; **Vienna** (60+ Cities Contacted; 20 Responded; 6 Interviewed)

Insight from Surveys/ Interviews:

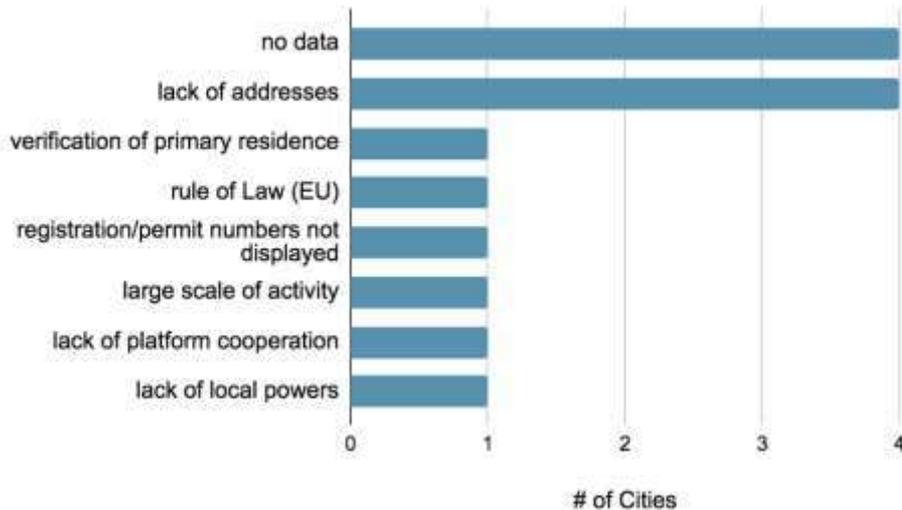
Protection of **Housing affordability or availability**¹; and **Taxes**² were by far the most important Policy Objectives for the cities surveyed.

1. 14 of 16 Cities
2. 13 of 16 Cities

Barriers to Ensuring Compliance



Insight from Surveys/ Interviews:

In addition, cities also mentioned:

- EU Services Directive and E-Commerce Directive
- European Court of Justice (UCJ) Ruling (on Paris fining Platforms for displaying illegal listings)
- Lack of Regulatory Powers

Recommended Data Strategies

- How to use STR Data
 - Policy Formation
 - Political and Public Awareness
 - Proving that Regulation is in the Common Interest
 - Compliance and Enforcement
- Public STR Data is Available
 - Scraping (internal and 3rd party)
 - Collaboration Opportunities
- Platform STR Data is Available
 - Regulate don't Negotiate
 - For Some: Collaborate around national (or EU) legislation
 - For US Cities: Follow San Francisco and Santa Monica

Recommended Negotiation Strategies

- Most Cities recommended **Regulation OVER Negotiation**
- Negotiations were **most successful** when it involved **existing regulation**
 - e.g. **Agreements on responding to take-down requests**
 - Barcelona: After fining platforms
 - San Francisco: Settlement Agreement
- **Negotiation with or Regulating Platforms to Remit and Report Tax is a Clear Opportunity**
- European Cities mostly suggested that **Lobbying the EU would be more effective than Negotiating with Platforms**

Recommended Collaboration Strategies

Most Cities were not positive about the idea of a collaborative negotiation with platforms.

Instead, they identified the following collaborative opportunities/examples:

- Regional Cooperation
 - e.g. Barcelona -> Experts helping other Spanish Cities
 - e.g. Vienna -> Data Scraping for other German Speaking Cities
- Creating Regional/National Laws
 - Lyon; Paris; Bordeaux etc -> French
- EU Lobbying
- Sharing Resources
 - Scraping Technology and Advice
 - Data/Reports
 - Regulations
